Noted Historian to Lecture...

The Lawrence Historical Society is proud to announce that Dr. James M. McPherson will be the initial speaker in a planned series of lectures. Dr. McPherson will speak on "The Global Effect of the American Civil War" at 2 pm, Sunday May 16th in the meeting room of the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville. Admission is free and a reception will follow the lecture.

Dr. McPherson, the George Henry Davis Professor of History at Princeton University, won the Pulitzer Prize in 1989 for his book *Battle Cry of Freedom*. It has been called the best single-volume study of the American Civil War. Widely recognized as the preeminent living expert on that war, he has written extensively both for adults and children and served as consultant on the Ken Burns PBS documentary. Professor McPherson is noted for his treatment of the contributions of African-Americans and abolitionists in the struggle to free slaves. He is a leader in the effort to preserve important historical sites such as Civil War battlefields.


LHS Receives PACF Grant (continued from p. 1)

Lawrence Township Deputy Mayor Pam Mount, School Superintendent Dr. Max R. Riley, Lawrence Historian Richard Graja, Delaware & Raritan Canal Parks Superintendent Susan Herron, Rider University professor Brooke Hunter, Hunter Research archeologist Dr. Ian Burrow and seven Society trustees. The committee is charged with drafting a long range plan for consideration by the board. The plan will be presented to the full membership at the annual meeting in February 2005.

The restoration of the 1761 Brearley House in May of 2000 was the culmination of years of work and dedication. Currently, the Society focuses on topics related to the era between 1760 and the date of the construction of the 1830 Port Mercer Canal House.

Irwin Stoolmacher of the Stoolmacher Consulting Group will serve as the project facilitator. His firm specializes in long-range planning, fundraising and community relations for non profit organization. A questionnaire has been developed by the steering committee and has been mailed to over 1300 members and friends of the Society. It will also be distributed through the local school system and to targeted groups including Lawrence's senior citizens and Spanish speaking populations.



A December to Remember...

In 2003, December came in like a lion and left in a blaze of glory in the Great Meadow. On Sunday, Dec. 7th, nearly a foot of snow kept all but 30 or so hardy celebrants from our annual Wassail Party. However, the Garden Gate Garden Club, Adorn European Florist, and Village Traditions managed to get through to decorate the rooms, the Girl Scouts decorated 30 gingerbread men, Caryn Goldenberg, in period dress, and Dan Oberst, on skis, made *The Trentonian*, John Halverson made the wassail, and Don Meisel, Paul Gatterdam, and Jim Williams made it possible for drivers to navigate the narrow plowed lane of Meadow Road.

The weather man was far kinder to us on New Year's Eve, when about 200 celebrants arrived to watch Joe Logan's great Hogmanay bonfire and sing along to Graham Kronk's bagpipes. The fire was fueled from the branches of a great 100+ year old oak tree that snapped on the northern edge of the meadow during the fall tornadoes. The somewhat "green" wood made it a bit more challenging and time consuming to start the blaze!

Later, inside the house, several very young dancers stepped lively to Graham's fiddle playing. This year, the usual hot cocoa was supplemented by three fine carrot cakes, a gift of John Marshall of Main Street Catering. Several of the children couldn't resist dipping a finger into the frosting on a purely decorative fourth cake that featured our 1761 "We Dig History" logo. It still tasted good!

January arrived in time for Colonel Edward Hand to delay and preoccupy British and Hessian troops, thus, ensure victory at the Battle of Princeton. It was the 42nd Annual Reenactment which originally included a conflict at the Shabakunk Creek.
